# Bible Translation for the Dobel people in Indonesia

Hello, this is an update on the how the Dobel Bible Translation project is going and some information on the situation there regarding the Covid-19 pandemic.

After being back home for Christmas, I, Jock, went back out to Indonesia and the plan was to stay until early April and then come back for a couple of months. Katy came out in early February and left, as planned to return on 17 March. Our plan was to work on the translation of 1 and 2 Corinthians with the Dobel translation team. As a team we worked on translating 2 Corinthians starting with the first draft done by a team member, and took it through all of its stages, including checking the translation in the community, so that now it is ready for its final check with a Bible Translation Consultant. 1 Corinthians was waiting for its final consultant check, and our translation consultant, Kathy, came out to the Aru Islands and we completed the check during February, so 1 Corinthians is now ready for publication, and in fact, along with Romans which was completed at the end of last year, has now been added to the Dobel Scripture app for Android phones (search with quotes on Google Play: "Alkitab Dobel").

After Katy had left Dobo and was on her way home to Scotland, it became clear that if I were going to return at all, I would have to leave early. This was easier said than done, and I do thank all of you who prayed for me during my somewhat challenging journey. I first had to change my flight. I tried phoning the airline office in Indonesia, but couldn't get through, and was put in a long queue. But before it was answered my phone cut off every time. In the end I asked if any of our children in the UK could phone the office in London. Our son Malcolm and daughter -in-law, Laura, offered to help. In the end after waiting about two hours Laura got through and made the change. I was emailed an updated ticket, then the very next day I got another email saying that my flight had been cancelled and to phone the airline to arrange another one!! Again I couldn't get through, and again Malcolm helped me out, this time waiting for over two hours in the middle of the night. I now had to arrange flights to get to the capital Jakarta (about 2000 miles away from the remote islands where we work). I managed this and arrived in Jakarta, only to hear from a fellow missionary whom I met at the airport that Singapore would not be accepting transit passengers from that evening.

My flight was due in that evening and my flight to London was due to leave the next morning. It turned out that my flight from Jakarta to Singapore was the last one before they stopped allowing transit passengers through! The following morning, before my flight left Singapore, all we transit passengers were called by the police to go to immigration to register, and we wondered what that meant - but in the end we left on the flight to London, I arrived in London the day after the UK lockdown started, and was met by our daughter Fiona, and husband Mike and their children Zibbie and Freddie. After a night with them, I got a train up to Lockerbie, where Katy met me and took me home to a fortnight of self-imposed guarantine. It turned out that the very evening after Fiona and Mike took me to the station. Mike came down with Corona virus. All the more reason for me to stay quarantined, but by the grace of God, I did not get the virus. Fiona did get it after Mike. Mike and Fiona are much better now, although both of them still have residual respiratory issues 7 weeks later. Thank you again for your prayers for that difficult journey.

It now looks like we won't be able to go back to Indonesia for a while, but there is a lot of work that I can do on the translation on my own, and we have also been able to set up Zoom meetings between me and the Dobel translation team in the Aru Islands to actually work together on the translation. So we met every day for a week in mid-May to discuss and revise the translation of the book of 1 Peter, and hope to do the same again soon for 2 Peter. This involves me getting up early to catch the team in their late afternoon. We can manage 2 to 3 hours of meeting together that way. The team come into the translation office to get an internet connection, and sit in different rooms for social distancing, and then we are able to have our Zoom meetings.

The team have told me that the virus has not made much impact on the Aru Islands yet. The Indonesian government has shut down all internal air and sea travel until the first of June, and all offices, schools and places of worship are closed, so that helps. On the other hand, if the virus does take hold in any given town or village, it will be hard to stop it spreading, because social distancing is more or less impossible. So many people live together in small houses, and the houses are close together. In the villages, people carry water from a communal well or spring, so there is daily contact in these places. Indonesia is a huge and widely spread out country of about 17,000 islands and a population of around 270 million people. Some of the larger islands have very big populations and high population density. Please pray for wisdom for leaders and good communication. Another problem is that rumours and false information about Covid-19 are spreading all over the place, and many people don't know how to distinguish the truth from the rumours. The official figures say only 14,000 cases in the country and 991 deaths (11 May), but we suspect it is much higher.

### Gardening Tips for the Summer

Any trees, shrubs or perennials which have been planted in the last 6 months will require an occasional good soak (once a week) to help them establish.

The same will apply for summer bedding; many of these plants originally come from hotter and drier countries and they will require watering for 2 or 3 weeks to get them established.

If you have containers and hanging baskets full of summer bedding, they require to be watered once a day throughout the summer. If you think of the surface area of these containers, it is very small and so even if it rains, very little moisture gets to the roots of the plants.

With plants in containers, feed them with a liquid feed once a week; potting composts only have enough food in them to last 6 weeks. You don't want your plants going hungry and not flowering as well as they could.

In your kitchen/vegetable garden keep successional showings of beet-root, carrots, spring onions, dwarf french beans and lettuce going throughout the summer to ensure you have a continuous supply of home grown, tasty food.

Any extra young lettuce plants can always be shared with your friends and neighbours!

People often have problems with blossom-end rot. This is when the young tomato fruit goes black at the bottom. There are lots of myths about what causes this but it is actually caused by irregular watering. This is when the compost in the grobag or container dries out throughout the day. During the growing season, tomatoes can be very thirsty and require watering twice a day. I use 21 plastic milk cartons or plastic bottles. Cut off the base of the carton/bottle then remove the plastic cap. Insert the carton/ bottle cap end first into the grobag/container and push firmly into the grobag/container.


Once you have thougherly watered the grobag/container, then fill the upturned carton with water and this will slowly seep into the compost reducing the chance of it drying out during the day and causing blossom-end rot.

Tomatoes also benefit from being watered with a solution of Epsom salts once a week when the fruit is forming- 2 teaspoons of Epsom salts to a 2g watering can, this is alongside feeding with regular tomato fertiliser.

To keep roses flowering for longer during the summer remove all dead flowers to encourage new ones to grow.

Do remember to find time to sit in your garden and enjoy the beauty of all your hard work. You will be surprised how close to God you can feel in a garden!



David's brothers were in Israel's army. He came to bring them food, and he heard Goliath. He is insulting God!
















