On 6 November the team attended an all day conference where we met virtually with the other Scottish churches who are continuing with year 2 of the project. Also speaking at the conference was Jake Mulder, whom we have got to know quite well over the last year. He is on the staff of Fuller Youth Institute, and lives in Grand Rapids, Michigan. We felt very sorry for Jake as our 9am start was a 4am start for him – that's commitment for you! He opened by encouraging us to have an honest assessment of our reality now that we are one year into the project. If Growing Young is about culture change in our church, where can we see this happening? He encouraged us to look for fruit in unpredictable places (I'll share a story about this at some point!).

Our task before our next sessions is to envision what our church would look like if we got to 2025 and discovered that all of our hopes and prayers had come to fruition. We are being encouraged to be bold, and stretch from the status quo – indeed the phrase of the day was that we should have BHAGs – Big Hairy Audacious Goals.

There will be things we need to STOP doing. Other things we can CONTINUE (largely as is). Some things we will want to CREATE, start from scratch.

After listening to input from the congregation, consideration and prayer, we have created evening services under 4 themes: Pray together, Grow together, Worship together and Eat together. Hopefully you have heard plenty about this in church, but if you would like to know more, please ask or come along to the centre at 6.30 on Sundays.

We often say that people can ask us anything, or give us some input. Of course, in reality this almost never happens. So if you have a BHAG you could share with us, please do!

# The Dobel Bible translation project An Update from Jock and Katy Hughes

A year ago Katy and I wrote an article in this magazine telling you how we were having to adapt to continuing the Bible Translation project in Indonesia, with us working from our house in Dalton and our team in Indonesia working there. We wondered if we'd be able to return to Indonesia in 2021, but here we are a year later, and that has not yet been possible. Since then the Covid virus has hit Indonesia hard, but by God's grace none of our friends and colleagues there have been badly affected, although one team member did test positive earlier in the year. There have been long periods where the team could not meet together to work, but just recently they have started working full-time once again, for which we are thankful. Last year I wrote that we were working on translating the books of 1 and 2 Peter and Hebrews. Now these books are all completed except for the final check with a Bible translation consultant, part of the process that is best done face to face with the team. Over the last year, I have spent a lot of time working through the team's draft of the book of Matthew verse by verse, checking that it is clearly communicating the meaning of the original text in Greek. That involves studying the book and reading commentaries and other helps to make sure I know what the meaning actually is (exegesis), and then making suggestions to the team as to what changes might be needed to the first draft. Two Dobel team members, Eka and Abua, are then going over my suggestions adding notes as to whether they think my suggestions make sense, and sometimes adding their own suggestions of ways to communicate the meaning. When I'm finished the exegesis, I'll go over their notes making changes when I agree, and flagging things for discussion when I'm not sure. Then we will meet together (either on Zoom or in person, if God opens the way for us to make a trip to Indonesia after New Year) to finalise the draft. This will then first be checked for clear understanding with members of the Dobel community, and then finally will need to be checked by a Bible translation consultant.

While this is going on, another team member, a young woman named Yoke, is looking over Mark's Gospel, which was the first book we published away back in 1991. She is making notes on things that she thinks need to be revised before the New Testament is published. The fourth member of our team, Yustus, is working on first drafts of the Old Testament, currently the book of Esther.

Now that we don't need to quarantine in a hotel on return from Indonesia, we are considering making a trip there, possibly in early February. Please pray that we'd be able to do that safely and that by then Indonesia will be letting vaccinated people from the UK in without too many expensive or logistically awkward restrictions. We are hoping that the translation consultant with whom we work, Kathy from the USA, will also be able to come at that time, and we'll be able to get the final checks done on 2 Corinthians, 1 and 2 Peter and Hebrews. That will only leave Matthew for the New Testament to be finished.

Thank you again, so much for your prayers and support for us.


You can include pets or other animals in the photo but please do not include any people.

# ZAYTOUN ALMOND AND DARK CHOCOLATE FAIRTRADE COOKIES



This recipe makes 20 – 25 cookies.


#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 100g Zaytoun almonds
- 200g self-raising flour
- 200g plain flour
- ½ tsp salt
- 140ml of Zaytoun olive oil
- 200g Fairtrade dark brown, soft sugar
- 100g Fairtrade caster sugar
- 1 tsp Fairtrade vanilla extract
- 1 egg and 1 egg yolk
- 100g dark Fairtrade chocolate, cut into small chunks

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C or Gas Mark 6 and line two large baking trays with parchment paper.
- 2. Roughly chop the almonds and then mix the chunks with the flours and salt in a large bowl.
- 3. Then add the sugars and vanilla extract to the olive oil and whisk well.
- 4. Beat the eggs into the mixture, then pour into the flour mix and stir well. Add the chocolate chunks and mix.
- 5. Roll the dough pieces into small balls, about the size of a walnut, and space them out on the baking trays. Flatten each ball slightly with the palm of your hand.
- 6. Bake for 10 minutes or until lightly brown. Let them cool before transferring to a cooling rack. Eat when cool or store in a biscuit tin.

With attractive colour illustrations, age-appropriate text and a variety of puzzles, the book could be useful in church outreach activities with children aged four to seven. A little book for little fingers!


# Be Still – a simple guide to Quiet Times By Brian Heasley, SPCK, £9.99 In this easy-to-read guide, Brian Heasley explores the



The Romans had made Herod king of the Jews about 30 years earlier.




