The Minister

Dear friends,

I am writing this letter following the Presbytery Meeting last night that detailed the Presbytery Plan for our presbytery. The Presbytery has had a large number of vacancies especially in recent years with currently only 10 of the 20.9 posts we were allowed, actually being filled. As a result, most ministers and some elders are Interim Moderators, some for many years with the same charge and many congregations have had to adapt to working without a settled ministry. When preparing the new Presbytery Mission Plan, the Ministry and Resources Committee visited every congregation separately to discuss with them their work and worship as a community of Christ's church, what they saw as the challenges facing them, and who they saw as their natural working partners for the future. In rural areas, particularly in Nithsdale, concern was expressed about the complete lack of young people who were involved in Church. Leadership was getting older and frailer and it was hard to encourage new people into leadership positions.

In Dumfries the different churches had all developed their own distinct theology and worship styles. The parish system, which is still very prevalent in the rural areas, is not nearly so prevalent in the town where the congregations are more gathered and members choose which church to worship in, not because of the parish they live in, but because the worship style and theology suits them. Combining churches in Dumfries, which would seem sensible geographically, was not so sensible when looked at in more detail.

The Five Marks of Mission

- 1. Proclaiming the good news of the kingdom
- 2. Teaching, baptising and nurturing new believers
- 3. Responding to human need by loving service
- 4. Seeking to transform unjust structures of society, challenging violence of every kind and pursuing peace and reconciliation
- 5. Striving to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustaining and renewing the life of the earth.

The draft plan with the mission narrative and ministerial resourcing was presented at the Presbytery meeting on 23 February. Congregations are requested to submit comments in writing, preferably by email, to the convener of the Ministry and Resources committee before its next meeting on March 30th. We are hoping that the buildings audit will also have been completed by then. A redrafted plan, including the designation of buildings will then go to Presbytery for its meeting at the end of April.

(the figures in brackets is the population of the parish, 1FTE means one full time equivalent minister)

It should be remembered that this is a draft Plan and Kirk Sessions are encouraged to submit to the convenor of Mission and Resources their views. It should also be remembered that ministers in full status, which are all ministers in our presbytery, can't be forced to take on new responsibilities if they don't want to.



The team started the year remembering Paul's prayer in Ephesians 3 - that they (and we) may

By the time you read this our second project - marshalling at the Junior Parkrun on 6 March- will have taken place (and we're now naming these projects 'Community together' in line with our together theme).



Our team is meeting on 2 March, and we then have a summit with FYI and the other congregations on 26 March - please pray for us!

As we move forward, we realise more and more that Growing Young needs the active support and participation of the whole congregation. We have been thinking about the concept of opening doors, especially doors of different types of serving, with the hope that people will be open to the prompting of the Spirit, choosing to walk through. Keep a lookout for a door of service opening for you!

Calling all bakers!

The Church of Scotland is currently offering this for free. There are no tests or exams during or after this course. This course is delivered through a third party training partner and is entirely online.

Jock and Katy Hughes.

As many of you will realise, we are still in the UK. We had thought we might be able to make a trip to Dobo, in the Aru Islands of Indonesia, in February and March, but because of Covid and restrictions for entry into Indonesia, this hasn't been possible. The main reason for making a trip was to do the final Bible Translation consultant check of four books of the Dobel New Testament - 2 Corinthians, 1 & 2 Peter and Hebrews. The consultant, Kathy, who was going to do these checks was available to travel to Dobo between mid-February and mid-March. There had been a ban on people from the UK entering Indonesia until mid-January. They then lifted that, but there was an 8-10 day compulsory quarantine on arrival in the country. It would take time for us to get a visa, and we realised that by the time we and Kathy actually got to Dobo, there wouldn't have been enough time to do the checks before Kathy had to leave, never mind the huge costs involved. As things turned out, it seems that the Omicron variant of Covid reached Dobo in early February and there have been many cases, resulting in schools being closed, and possibly there would have been restrictions on getting the number of people together needed to do the checking.

This doesn't mean though that the check isn't going ahead. We had a Zoom meeting with Kathy to discuss other ways to do this final check. She had recently done some checking successfully using audio recording sent on WhatsApp. After listening to those, she sent back questions and the answers were recorded. So, Kathy suggested we try something like this. Jock and the Dobel team decided to try this new way doing a check of 2 Peter, which is the shortest of the four books needing to be checked. The Dobel team started by reading short passages from 2 Peter to people from the Dobel-speaking community, and then reading just a verse or a sentence or two, and asking people to retell what they heard in their own words. This is what was recorded and was sent to Jock. By listening back, Jock can highlight things that may have been misunderstood or may not have been translated accurately, and he translates the retellings into English and then he sends them to Kathy. Between them they will send questions back for the Dobel team to ask those doing the check. It's a much longer process than if everyone was in Dobo and doing the check face-to-face, but until that is possible, this is a good alternative and means things can progress.

We are very thankful that, to date, we haven't had Covid and we have had both vaccinations and the booster. We've enjoyed some lovely times with our family - at Christmas with all our children and their families, and in February with all Jock's siblings and their spouses.

For those of you who pray for us and our work, thank you so much.

Remembering Mothers

The honouring of mothers goes back to Roman times. Each Spring, a pagan festival honoured Cybele, supreme Goddess of Fertility and Mother of all the Gods. Other celebrations paid tribute to Mother Earth. From the Middle Ages, in England, it became traditional for outdoor labourers and craftsmen to have a day off in Lent. Later, domestic servants were also given short leave to visit their mother and family.

These brief holidays became opportunities to go to church. This might have been their home church or their nearest cathedral. The Services at the 'mother' church symbolised the coming together of families. The term 'Mothering Sunday' dates from the 16^{th} century. This year it falls on the 27^{th} March.

'Mother's Day' is a secular festival. It originated in 1908 after a woman called Anna Jarvis held a church memorial service for her mother in West Virginia, USA. She was a peace activist and a nurse. She founded Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues. Anna wanted people to honour the mother of the family, maternal bonds, and the influence of mothers in society. Before she died Anna regretted the commercialism that followed and expressed that this was never her intention.

Many mothers are mentioned in the Bible along with interesting stories about them. These include Eve, Hagar, Leah, Ruth and Bathsheba, to mention only a few. A few times God enabled childless women to have a baby: Rachel, Rebekah, Manoah's wife (unnamed) and Hannah who eventually gave birth to Joseph, Jacob, Samson and Samuel respectively. There was also Sarah, wife of Abraham, who aged 90 became the mother of Isaac.

It is possible that these miraculous births were remembered by the Virgin Mary.

We are starting to hope it will be possible to run a holiday club this summer - please speak to Alison to find out more.


Youth Fellowship



The younger son took his money and went to another country.




Then his money ran out and there was a famine.

He was so hungry he would have eaten their food.





The older son was so angry he wouldn't go into the house..





